

Goals of Evaluation


The goals of the program evaluation were to gauge 1) whether the community science monitoring program, the Pool Patrol, was meeting its primary program objectives and 2) receive feedback and suggestions from participants on their experience in order to provide targeted improvements to the program moving forward.


<u>Vernal Pool Patrol - Program Goals</u>

- 2) Increase awareness and understanding of vernal pools and their importance to wetland and forest ecosystems
- Increase public/youth engagement in natural resource science and stewardship



Vernal Pool Patrol Training

We asked volunteers and coordinators to reflect on their ability to complete monitoring protocols after going through the Vernal Pool Patrol training and what other resources would be helpful.

"Interesting, informative, hands-on!"

"I need a refresher on how to ID the different egg masses." "Identifying salamander larvae by species and plant ID's"

Does the Pool Patrol training set participants up for success?

Awareness and Understanding of Vernal Pools

We asked volunteers and coordinators to reflect on how their awareness and understanding of vernal pools changed after participating in the Pool Patrol. What were the rewards of participating in the program, as well as the challenges?

"The great number of pools around. Appreciating the need to respect the pools and surrounding areas and to be careful not to spread potential pathogens from pool to pool."

"I enjoy feeling like I am helping with the collection of data that would not be available if not for the volunteers."

"Maintaining volunteer interest from visit 2 (spring) to visit 3 (Fall). Also having enough supplies for everyone to do monitoring at their convenience."

"A true and deep love for fairy shrimp and sallies!"

Is the program rewarding for patrollers?

72% of volunteers and 100% of coordinators strongly agreed that they found participating in the Vernal Pool Patrol rewarding for reasons such as **learning new things**, **contributing to science**, (i.e "it's rewarding to participate in real, meaningful field work with the potential to improve conservation of these areas."), and **enjoying time in nature** and **sharing the experience** with others (family, students, friends).





What are the challenges?

The majority of patrollers also found their experience to be challenging. The reasons being primarily needing more **time** to collect all the data, **physical challenges** with monitoring (i.e. navigating the pool, finding species), **technical challenges** (i.e. Survey 123 & technology in general, and a **learning curve** that comes with participating (i.e. "Building up familiarity and researching species took some time").

Engagement Outside of Pool Patrol Monitoring

In order for us to better understand the impact of the program, we asked participants to share about their experiences outside of the Pool Patrol regarding vernal pools. Does the program serve as a networking opportunity for participants? Do patrollers feel like they are able to take what they learned from the program and share it? Is the vernal pool conversation growing?

"The big news piece validated my stumbling efforts to share what I was doing with quite a few people. A kid friend did a summer pool ecology class at our local math and science center and has been a helpful partner to me."

"My friend saw me post things about vernal ponds and now she is also a part of the patrol."

"Vernal pools have been featured in outreach materials (newsletters, emails, social media) much more in the last ~5 years or so."


"Coworkers and friends see photos I share out in the field and ask questions about VP's."

Is there a social aspect to patrolling?


Participating in the Pool Patrol has the potential to be a networking opportunity. Additionally, many patrollers were motivated to explore other conservation efforts in their communities!






How has ecological knowledge been impacted?


Patrollers are motivated to share and engage in further conservation. 92% of volunteers indicated that they intentionally shared information about vernal pools to increase conservation efforts, mostly at home (n = 41), at work (n = 37), with students (n = 24), or at community meetings (n = 20). There has been some noticeable discussion around vernal pools in participants' networks, largely through self-initiation of discussion or organizational discussion!











Are some patrollers taking action?

Knowledge or data gained from participating in the Pool Patrol has had some extended reach, with 26.7% of volunteers sharing that they have contributed their experience to aid in decision making or conservation efforts in their community. Five participants shared they have done this in their organizational involvements to some extent.





"Planning new parking lot development I shared locations of a vernal pool with design firm so that they would leave a good undisturbed buffer around the pool"

"I have utilized the vernal pool hub mapping system to gather data on what vernal pools may be left out of our current wetland ordinance, and what community leaders should consider adding to the ordinance for greater vernal pool protection."

"Helped my neighbor learn that he had a vernal pool" "Data collected will potentially be used for future stewardship considerations at properties owned by my organization. Data will also be shared with external researchers seeking wetland/water quality data about our area."

Program Coordinator Experience

The Pool Patrol would not be possible without the support of it's dedicated group of program coordinators, who help with recruiting and training citizen/community scientists across the state and ensuring data are being submitted to the database.

To provide better support to our program coordinators and the communities they work with, we asked for specific feedback on their experiences, challenges, and successes.

"The vernal pool hub has everything I need as a coordinator - the training manual is a wonderful resource and concise. I love the mapping system, I think this may be the most helpful to most volunteers, although some do struggle to use it with total success. The great thing is I am happy to input anything manually for volunteers, and the resources are very easy for me to access and send their way if they have any trouble with it."

"Kits with all the supplies need for monitoring available for purchase from VPP"

"A mid-season event to maintain interest, meet other volunteers and coordinators, maybe with some hands on learning." Involvement as a program coordinator varies, some host field trainings, some are a point of contact for those in the area, and others work with a set group of volunteers.

Program coordinators work with a varying number of volunteers. Those that participated in this survey indicated working with between **8-38 volunteers**.


